Dear Bill,

As required by statute (Rhode Island General Laws §24-18-7(c) "By the end of each calendar year, the department shall evaluate all submitted infrastructure plans and, in accordance with the project evaluation criteria, identify all eligible projects, and after a public hearing, the department shall finalize and provide the agency and statewide planning with a project priority list for the forthcoming calendar year."), RIDOT hereby submits the 2015 Project Priority List. We are also providing a copy of the criteria used to review the projects.

There were 15 projects submitted by 10 communities: these projects ranged from engineering studies to road resurfacing and bridge replacement. The single most requested type of project was road resurfacing, and many projects focused on areas in need of infrastructure to improve and promote business locations.

We assembled a review panel of four staff: one from the Rhode Island Economic Development Corporation, one from Statewide Planning, and two from within RIDOT. This panel met two times, in November to assemble the draft ranking, and again in December, following the public hearing. When the initial ranking was completed, there were several communities with projects tied at the same rank. In order to eliminate any potential confusion, the review panel met and awarded between one and three additional points to tied projects: a point for economic development; a point for higher functional classification roads; and a point for readiness to construct in calendar year 2015. As a result, there are no longer any tied rankings.
